- Research on avian flu has been extended to include native birds. All results to date have been negative.

Attachment 2 DFES report

- Transitioning from storm season to bushfire season.
- Three pre-season forums will be held on 14, 15 and 16 October in Brookton, Woodanilling and Hyden.
- A HAZMAT drill involving all emergency services was conducted at the Narrogin Regional Leisure Centre (NRLC) on Sunday 14 September in wet conditions. The exercise was successful, and similar drills are expected to be conducted annually.
- Introduced Stacey Sinclair as the new District Officer Emergency Management for the Upper Great Southern and Great Southern regions.

Vivienne Gardiner - DFES District Emergency Management Advisor

- Currently developing more user-friendly documents and training standards.
- Reminded agencies to ensure that contact details use Duty Officer numbers rather than individuals numbers.

Michael Phillips – Department of Communities

Attachment 3 Department of Communities Emergency Relief and Support LEMC report – 1st quarter 2025-2026.

- Planning to run Evacuation Centre training for the Narrogin district on 1 or 8 October 2025.
- Communities, in collaboration with DFES Recovery and other agencies, is coordinating a project to improve post-disaster accommodation capacity. A sub-project is underway to develop a state policy position for medium to long-term temporary accommodation.

Brett Dew – Western Power

- Staffing shortages continue; new apprentices have commenced in Katanning and Kondinin.
- Workloads are being managed by staff with contractor support.
- Raised the question of how Western Power can gain access when roads are closed. The consensus was to contact the CEO of the relevant Shire. This will be discussed further at the ROAC meeting on 18 September 2025.
- Inspections are on schedule; maintenance works are being prioritised by risk.

Brendan Firman – Shire of Narrogin Manager Recreational Services

- The HAZMAT drill conducted on the weekend was highly successful.
- Training is being undertaken on handover processes, chemical risks, and effective community communication.

Attachment 4 DBCA – Parks & Wildlife Services report September 2025

- Ongoing staff vacancies remain an issue.
- Re-loader training scheduled for late October/early November.
- Staff have participated in pre-season fitness and training activities.

- A CESM has been appointed and is expected to commence in mid-October.

Anthony Mort – Cuballing Chief Bush Fire Control Officer

- Brigades are preparing for the upcoming fire season, with vehicle servicing and inspections underway.

- Moving out of flu season; emergency plans are being reviewed for potential heatwave conditions.
- Desktop emergency exercises are currently being conducted.

Senior Sergeant Ryan Devine - WA Police

- The station is now effectively fully staffed.
- Traffic capability has been expanded.
- Staff participated in the HAZMAT drill at the NRLC.
- Additional staff are undertaking land search training.

Eloisa Goss - Narrogin Primary School

- The school has provided a copy of its Incident Management Plan.
- A recent evacuation drill was conducted; procedures were reviewed and improved with DFES assistance.
- A lockdown practice is scheduled in the near future.

Chris Paget - Chief Executive Officer, Shire of Cuballing

- Requested and has been granted an extension for the AWARE grant acquittal, now due 30 September 2025.

DPIRD's role in emergency management

- DPIRD is the Hazard Management Agency (HMA) for animal and plant pests and disease incursions. Refer to the [State Hazard Plan: Animal and Plant Biosecurity](#) for information on DPIRD's legislated roles and responsibilities.
- DPIRD is the executor of the State Support Plan for Animal Welfare in Emergencies. This includes livestock, horses, and companion animals. Refer to the [State Support Plan: Animal Welfare in Emergencies](#) for information on DPIRD's legislated roles and responsibilities.
- DPIRD may from time to time provide support to other agencies where requested. This includes administering some components of the [Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements WA](#).

Emergency Management Directorate

Learning & Development

DPIRD EM Preparedness Team are working through the emergency management training program for the 2025/2026 calendar year.

Following SEMC endorsement (March 2025) of the revised State Support Plan of Animal Welfare in Emergencies (SSP-AWiE) – DPIRD has commenced planning an exercise to test the SSP-AWiE arrangements in accordance with State Emergency Management Policy. The Exercise will be a Desktop format and will be held in Oct 2025.

Emergency Animal Disease (EAD) Preparedness

DPIRD has recently conducted a number of internal workshops focused on EAD preparedness across the preparedness, response and recovery phases to build awareness and capacity.

New Director

DPIRD's Emergency Management Directorate (EMD) has a new Director, Scott Beaton. Scott was DPIRD's Director of Work, Health, Safety & Wellbeing and has a background and experience in emergency management.

Current Vacancies

The EM Directorate has gone through a significant restructure. DPRD is currently advertising two new positions being Assistant Director, Emergency Preparedness and Assistant Director, Emergency Coordination.

Additionally, DPIRD will be advertising shortly a Learning and Development Coordinator position which has recently become vacant due to a resignation.

National alerts and investigations

Avian Influenza

CURRENT STATUS in WA: Absent – no known detections

Responses to outbreaks of H7 high pathogenic avian influenza are currently underway in Victoria, New South Wales, and the ACT. Note that this is not the H5 strain currently causing concern globally. DPIRD is monitoring the situation and undertaking preparedness

activities. Also, DPIRD is providing personnel and resources to support jurisdictions with confirmed outbreaks. Poultry producers and owners are encouraged to view our [avian influenza page](#) for information on preparedness and detection.

Tomato brown rugose fruit virus

CURRENT STATUS IN WA: Absent – no known detections

A highly contagious plant virus affecting tomatoes, capsicums, and chillies. It has been detected in South Australia in August 2024. It presents a significant risk to growers and the industry if established. No known detections in Western Australia currently. Industry and backyard growers are encouraged recognise and report signs and symptoms of the virus if found. Information is available on our [tomato brown rugose fruit virus page](#).

Animal Welfare in Emergencies

DPIRD is the executor of the State Support Plan for Animal Welfare in Emergencies (AWiE). Please note the following important notices regarding AWiE for district and local representatives:

- DPIRD's Incident and Emergency Management Branch is undertaking preparedness and response activities where activated under the [State Support Plan - Animal Welfare in Emergencies](#).
- DPIRD is working with the SEMC to finalise responses to feedback on the proposed improvements to the [State Support Plan - Animal Welfare in Emergencies](#). The review is scheduled to be finalised in late 2025.

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Update

- **Storm Response** - With Storm Season being upon us – Emphasis on storm awareness and ensuring LGs have storm preparedness and response in mind. Some key information to circulate in the season would be the changes to the Australian Warning System around Storm and Flood. As well as the SES line, when to call the SES for assistance. Also ensure you have a communication strategy in place in the event of power outage and communication outage. State Emergency Service Number on **132 500**
- **Emergency WA** – Use Emergency WA as your source of Truth for Incident Information. Stay up to date with [Emergency WA](#), with the New Emergency WA App now available on IOS and Android devices. Allowing you to stay up to date with real-life live data and updates. Able to set watch zones and receive updates if an incident occurs nearby.
- **Training Calendar** – We are starting to wrap up the Upper Great Southern Training Calendar, with only another month of training to go before Bushfire Season is upon us.
- **Leadership Forum** – The UGS Region held the annual Leadership forum on the 2nd of August 2025 this event went well, and it was an important investment in our Brigades and Units as it improves all aspects of the Prevention, Preparedness, Response and Recovery. We had key guest speakers from around the state attend. We had around 50 leaders attend from around the Upper Great Southern Region, from a mix of services from VFRS, VFES, BFB, and SES.
- **Incident Management Training** – Incident Controller Level 1, we are running a 4 day course that requires significant pre-requisites and investment for brigade leaders across the region, this is planned over 2 weekends in October, it will significantly boost our regions capability to respond and manage incidents locally.
- **Emergency Planning** - We are encouraging stakeholders to review and test their local emergency response plans around Bushfire, Storms and Power/Communication Outages in preparations for the current Storm Season and transition into Bushfire Season.
- **Regional Duty Coordinator** – The DFES UGS Regional Duty Coordinator or RDC is On call 24/7 365 days a year, available to all Key Stake Holders, and Response agencies. Bushfire Brigades and Local Governments are encouraged to contact the RDC if they require assistance at incident, such as Air Support, Machinery Support, additional resources and Officer attendance. Stakeholders are encouraged to contact the RDC should they need local information, for example should a School cancel their bus route due to an incident nearby. Please note, the RDC does not replace 000 or the DFES Comcen.

- **Regional Storm Exercise** – The Regional Storm Exercise was held in Kulin on the 30th of July, Good attendance from LGs and Agencies, with attendance from Kulin LG, Wickiepin LG, Lake Grace LG, Wandering LG, Water Corp, Main Roads, Dept Communities, Dept Health, WAPOL, Kulin VFRS, and DFES. - **HAZMAT Drill** - Sunday 14th Sept @ 0900-1130hrs we are running a regional capability drill with the Volunteer Fire and Rescue and Narrogin Regional Leisure Centre.

Regional Leisure Centre Staff Objectives

1. Practise **identifying and reporting HAZMAT indicators** (e.g., chemical smells, spills, symptoms).
2. Demonstrate **clear and structured handover of incident information** to arriving emergency services, including: Location and nature of the hazard, Number and condition of affected individuals, Initial containment actions taken
3. Test **internal evacuation and lockdown procedures** in response to a HAZMAT scenario.

VFRS Objectives

1. Practise **establishing Hot, Warm, and Cold Zones** in accordance with HAZMAT containment protocols.
2. Conduct **safe retrieval and decontamination of affected individuals** from the Hot Zone.
3. Test **deployment of HAZMAT equipment**, including PPE, containment barriers, and decontamination stations.
4. Coordinate with Leisure Centre staff and other emergency services to ensure **scene safety and operational efficiency**.

SJA and WAPOL have been invited also, as discussed last LEMC, and it looks to be a productive morning. *Please be aware and make your networks aware of this event so when they see emergency vehicles and activities are the Rec Centre that morning there is no false concern.*

This is a key drill for us as the increase of large commercial infrastructure in the region and the changing landscapes of renewables and carbon farming intersects business and response operations. Understanding emerging risk and changing landscape will be key in our LEMC.

- **Welcome** – Stacey Sinclair joins the Narrogin Office as the District Officer Emergency Management across the Upper Great Southern and Great Southern Regions. Stacey comes with a wealth of experience in exercising and country operations and is a welcomed addition to the team. She is based in Narrogin and will be part of our Duty Co-Ordinator roster.

Regional Specific Update

- Evacuation Centre training looking to be run for the Narrogin district on 1 October 2025. All welcome to attend. More details will be discussed at the LEMC.

ERS Preparedness

- The National Emergency Management Agency (NEMA) has drafted a paper for the June 2025 Australia New Zealand Emergency Management Committee (ANZEMC) meeting that outlines the final recommendations of the **Register.Find.Reunite. (RFR)** Time Limited Working Group.
- The Paper identifies that the Working Group was unable to agree on a single national capability to address registration and reunification requirements.
- It was agreed that NSW, QLD, VIC, NT and WA will continue to fund RFR while they individually scope alternative capabilities and to amend State arrangements where RFR is listed.
- While Communities is supportive of funding RFR beyond 2024-25, it is taking proactive steps in response to the recommendation to move away from RFR as a national solution.
- Communities will commence a project to assess current RFR capability and explore alternative solutions that may assist the Department to meet its Registration and Reunification’ functional responsibilities under the State Support Plan – Emergency Relief and Support.
- It is anticipated that any new capability may require additional funding beyond the current financial commitment for RFR, particularly in the absence of national cost-sharing under the existing arrangements.

- In 2015 the State Emergency Management Committee (SEMC) identified a policy gap regarding **medium to long-term emergency accommodation**.
- The State Support Plan – Emergency Relief and Support outlines Communities’ responsibility for emergency accommodation.
- State and local government agencies have coordinated medium to long-term accommodation solutions for impacted residents following more recent events, however the State Emergency Management Framework does not prescribe a responsible agency for medium to long-term emergency accommodation.
- In 2024, Emergency Relief and Support and DFES Recovery coordinated a multi-agency working group to improve the State’s capability and preparedness in providing post-disaster accommodation
- Communities is coordinating a sub-project to progress and define a state policy position for medium to long-term temporary accommodation.
