#### Background

This item is re-presented from the Narrogin District Townscape Committee meeting held on 29 March 2018.

At the Narrogin District Townscape Committee meeting held on Thursday 29 March 2018, there was in attendance, two delegated Elected Members and two Deputy's; Cr Seale and Cr Fisher who were present as observers. Although they were ineligible to vote, Cr Seale and Cr Fisher moved and seconded Item 4.2 Highbury Townscape Study.

These votes were in breach of the Local Government Act 5.11A.

Therefore Item 4.2 Highbury Townscape Study is brought forward from the meeting 29 March 2018 and is re-presented to the Committee for endorsement.

#### Summary

In October 2015 H+H Architects were engaged to undertake a review of the 1988 Narrogin Townscape Study. The scope of works involved the Consultant undertaking workshops with members of the Community, Councillors and the Narrogin Townscape Advisory Committee.

In February 2017 Council endorsed the 2016 Narrogin Townscape Study Review at its Ordinary Council meeting.

In April 2017 H+H Architects were appointed to prepare a townscape plan for the Highbury town site following a request from the Highbury District Community Council. A draft document and site drawings was received by the Shire in June 2017, and forwarded to the Highbury District Community Council and the Narrogin District Townscape Committee for comment.

Both the Highbury District Community Council and the Narrogin District Townscape Committee responded to the draft with comments and questions which were addressed by H+H Architects Tom Stevens, and amendments were made to the document and site drawings in accordance with the request by the Highbury District Community Council.

#### Comment

The draft report was amended with the requested changes by the Highbury District Community Council and was endorsed by that Committee at its Ordinary Meeting held on 27 February 2018.

# **INTRODUCTION**

Following the recent completion of the Narrogin townscape study review, H+H Architects have been engaged by the Shire of Narrogin to undertake the preparation of a townscape study for the town of Highbury.

This study has been undertaken by H+H Architects with assistance from Sally Malone from Malone Design.

The methodology in approaching this review has been to visit the town and meet with the community to ascertain what is considered important for the future development of the town centre, followed by the preparation of this report and sketch plan.

This report references the Narrogin Townscape study and is designed to be read as an appendix of the main report.

Based on a review of the preliminary project brief, H+H Architects have identified the key aspects to the project, namely;

- Streetscape Opportunities
- Town Hall and surrounds enhancements
- Stopover bay improvements

# **STREETSCAPE OPPORTUNITIES**

Highbury is a compact little town set along the primary streets of Burley, Wilson and Campbell Streets and bounded by the Great Southern Highway (Scott St) to the east. Town centre homes are surrounded by a ring of nature reserves and undeveloped bush lots. Beyond this bushland frame is farmland and the town of Narrogin; 15km to the north.

Community life in Highbury is centered around the General Store and Tavern on the highway and the Town Hall and it recreational surrounds. The General Store has banners flying to announce that it is open for business, sells fuel and refreshment to visitors, and stocks an assortment of staple supplies for locals. The tavern is a beautiful 'colonial' style building with shady verandahs, a beer garden which hosts market days and events, and indoor dinning and bar areas.

The Town Hall is the focal point for most community events, including ANZAC ceremonies which are run at the adjacent memorial. 6 tennis courts back onto the Hall and there are toilets, play equipment, a small park and a basket ball hoop.

The Tavern and Town Hall are linked by red concrete pedestrian footpaths and wide roads with some verge tree planting. Visitors stopping in the town mainly park at the Westrail bus Stopover on the Highway opposite the General Store. The bay is equipped with public toilets, a giant sun dial, and picnic tables set among shady trees.

The town is neat and tidy and very compact, opportunities for enhancing its streetscape have been identified by local residents as:

- 1. Enhancing the highway Stopover bay, and
- 2. Improving the facilities and appearance of the Town Hall and its surrounds.

We would add a further opportunity, which is strengthening the links between the three activity areas of the town; Hall, Stopover bay and Tavern to make these easier for local residents to access and to highlight them as assets for visitors.

Local residents would also like to see the entry statements to the town upgraded, particularly on the north and south approaches.

# ENHANCEMENT RECOMMENDATIONS

Recommendations for townscape enhancement opportunities have been grouped into 4 projects:

- 1. Town Hall and surrounds enhancement;
- 2. Stopover bay development
- 3. Street verge improvements, and
- 4. Entry Statement upgrades.

#### 1. Town Hall and Surrounds Enhancement

The Highbury community have had discussions on what the issues at the hall and courts are, and what they would like to see improved. They have agreed that:

- The ANZAC memorial needs more space and to be brought into the precinct more rather than left isolated on the road verge;
- A better park to the west of the hall (Wilbur Park) would allow a variety of community events (such as outdoor movies) to be run and provide a space for locals to enjoy as a community hub;
- Play equipment needs to be located so tennis parents can supervise toddlers better and a separate space and equipment for older children is needed, and
- A small collection of adult outdoor gym equipment near the park would add fitness activities to the existing walk circuit being used in the town.

In addition, the community requested that the toilets behind the hall be upgraded for better access. This could be achieved by reconfiguring the entry area to provide compliant disabled access whilst protecting privacy and providing weather protection.

The community have prepared a sketch for the possible location for improvements. We have used this as the base for the concept plan prepared in this report.

The plan contained at the rear of this report illustrates the concept and includes annotations and notes for additional initiatives and recommendations. The recommendations have been broken into discrete project parcels to assist with funding and Shire budgeting – these are outlined in the Implementation Strategy at the rear of this report.

#### 2. Stopover Bay Development

The Shire has in recent years installed a toilet with disabled access at the stopover bay and will be erecting 3 banner poles adjacent to the sun dial and windmill. The community are in the process of sourcing funding for a fire fighting centre (truck, shed etc) and additional museum facilities around the existing wagon shed. This bay is also used by the Westrail bus, and a double sided shelter is needed for waiting passengers.

The bay has areas of shady trees and is an attractive stopping point for visitors who want a meal in the tavern or supplies from the Store. It is also used by truck drivers to drop haulage trailers and take a break.

The Stopover bay's attractiveness could be improved by:

- Formalising vehicle access and parking areas to reduce the expanse of open gravel;
- Additional tree planting for shade and to screen and soften less attractive areas, and
- Installation of a bus shelter, with the option to include information on the town and district, interpretation and/ or public artworks in the shelter.

The function of the Stopover bay could be improved with:

- New direction signage highlighting facilities at the Town Hall, and directions to the Tavern and General Store and any other town facilities or attractions.
- Clearer and more accessible pedestrian crossing points, and
- An RV waste dump point adjacent to the toilet (but not blocking access to the planned fire station).

The adequacy of night and security lighting may also need to be considered in improvements of the bay.

Possible staging options for budget purposes are outlined in the Implementation Strategy.

#### 3. Street Verge Improvements

Highbury has wide verges and each of the four main streets has a footpath on one verge and overhead power lines on one side. A walk circuit around Burley, Wilson, Campbell and Scott Streets is used by locals, and marked with name plaques on some streets.

The footpaths are in good condition, but are very exposed, and the lack of street tree avenues in the town streets makes them feel very wide and somewhat uninviting.

A programme of incremental street tree planting is recommended to provide shade over footpaths and help strengthen pedestrian links. Care needs to be taken when planting under overhead power lines to select low-growing species.

Usually one tree species is selected for a verge avenue, but the tree planting on Wilson St behind the toilet includes a mix of eucalypts which look great as a set, and are united by their size (see picture below). The advantage of a mixed avenue like this is that they often have different flowering times, and if one type of tree fails to thrive, the others help to fill the gaps.

The spacing used on Wilson St adjacent to the Town Hall is ideal for providing connecting shade and these species are also suitable for use under power lines.



The following tree species recommendations are taken from the 2016 Narrogin Townscape Study as being suitable for local conditions and in keeping with the Study's streetscape recommendations for the Shire.





#### Background

This item is re-presented from the Narrogin District Townscape Committee meeting held on 29 March 2018.

At the Narrogin District Townscape Committee meeting held on Thursday 29 March 2018, there was in attendance, two delegated Elected Members and two Deputy's; Cr Seale and Cr Fisher who were present as observers. Although ineligible to vote, Cr Seale moved Item 4.3 Street Tree Policy.

This vote was in breach of the Local Government Act 5.11A.

Therefore Item 4.3 Street Tree Policy is brought forward from the meeting 29 March 2018 and is re-presented to the Committee for endorsement.

#### Summary

At the Meeting held on 30 June 2016 it was noted that a Street Tree Policy was required to address the planting of appropriate trees. Subsequent Townscape Committee meetings throughout 2016 identified the need for the Street Tree Policy to address specific areas such as:

- 2. Damage to assets; i.e. roots interfering with footpaths and drains;
- 3. Interference with electrical supply i.e. branches and foliage affecting power poles and overhead power lines.

At the meeting held on 8 September 2017 it was reported that trees had been replaced in accordance with the *2010 Street Tree Planning: Selections and Recommendations Guide.* It was further noted a draft tree planting policy would be presented to the Committee for comment.

At the Meeting held on 9 November 2017 it was reported that the 2010 Street Tree Policy had been edited by the Executive Manager Technical and Rural Services.

#### Comment

The Committee are invited to comment on the attached draft 2017 Street Tree Policy. Developing a list of priority street tree planting will be addressed as a separate Minutes item at a later date.

At the Narrogin District Townscape Committee meeting held on 29 March 2018 the Officers Recommendation was that the "Narrogin District Townscape Committee Accept and Endorse the 2017 Street Tree Policy".

#### **Policy Statement**

- 1. Trees are a valuable community asset, enhancing both the built and the natural environment of the Shire. They contribute to the well-being of the community and through their longevity serve as a cultural link through generations.
- 2. The Shire of Narrogin recognises these values and is committed to the protection and maintenance of trees whilst maintaining its obligations to provide a safe environment.

#### **Policy Application**

#### 1. Tree Protection

- a) All trees on land under the care and control of the Shire of Narrogin will be protected in accordance with relevant local laws, regulations and acts and these guidelines.
- b) Significant trees on council and public property will be recorded in the *Street Tree Planning: Selections and Recommendations.*
- c) For development applications, retention of mature trees or trees of significance on public property may be included as a condition of approval, subject to Council decision.
- d) Trees on private property are the responsibility of the land owner.

#### 2. Tree Removal

- a) Authorisation: Removal of any tree on Shire of Narrogin controlled property can only be given by the Executive Manager, Technical and Rural Services (EMTRS), or the Chief Executive Officer (CEO). Disputes may be subject to formal referral to Council. Applications for tree removal must be in writing stating the reason why the tree should be removed.
- b) Replacement: In most instances of tree removal and where practicable, a replacement tree will be planted in a suitable location at the discretion of the EMTRS with reference to the *Street Tree Planning: Selections and Recommendations.*
- c) Removal not justified: Tree removal will not be justified by any of the following reasons:
  - i. Tree obscuring commercial advertising signs
  - ii. The growth of the tree is obstructing views
  - iii. Tree litter/leaf fall/debris
  - iv. Tree casting unwanted shade
  - v. Resident requests an alternate species
  - vi. A perceived danger a tree might fall in a storm
- d) Removal justified: Tree removal may be justified by any of the following reasons:
  - i. The tree is dead or dying and remedial techniques are not possible
  - ii. The tree is causing damage to property, infrastructure or public utilities and the cost of remedial works outweighs the value of the tree

iii. Where, subsequent to a risk assessment undertaken by the Shire of Narrogin, the tree presents an immediate danger to the public

#### 3. Tree Planting and Replacement

- a) The Shire shall be responsible for the planting and replacement of all street trees, trees in parks and trees on land under the care and control of the Shire of Narrogin.
- b) Trees will be chosen from the approved species list in the Street Tree Planning: Selections and Recommendations by the EMTRS.
- c) Trees under power lines whether new or replacement planting, will only be low growth species as listed in the *Street Tree Planning: Selections and Recommendations*, with the aim of reducing pruning costs and making better use of the Shire's resources.
- d) Well established trees will continue to be pruned as required, unless they are deemed as an unsuitable species by EMTRS whereby they may be removed.
- e) All tree planting near assets such as footpaths, roads, fences, installations such as electricity, water and other utilities where root invasion may cause damage to such asset will include the installation of root guards, to reduce or eliminate damage to other assets and property.
- f) Trees should be planted in winter, preferably June and July
- g) Local native species will be used when planting in rural or bushland areas.

#### 4. Street Tree Pruning and Maintenance

- a) Pruning and maintenance of trees will be undertaken by the Shire of Narrogin in an annual program which gives priority to under powerline pruning, the CBD, parks and other significant public spaces, and attends to other trees on an as needs basis.
- b) Tree pruning will only be authorised to be undertaken by personnel approved by the Shire of Narrogin who have suitable training and practical experience in arboricultural techniques.

Trees under powerlines will be pruned to meet clearance requirements as directed by Western Power or other electrical utilities of the day.

- c) Pruning will not be carried out for purposes such as to improve views, reduction of leaf fall debris, to provide visual access to commercial signs reduction of shade or other reasons that may detract from the natural amenity and purpose of the tree or where pruning will affect the health and structural integrity of the tree.
- d) The Shire of Narrogin will water new tree planting through the first two years on an as needs basis. Should a resident wish to water and care for a new street tree that is directly in front of or adjoining their property then the EMTRS may approve this.

#### 5. Development Requests

- a) Where tree removal is approved in a development plan at the request of private land owners or commercial developers, the full cost of the tree removal including stump grinding and site remediation will be met by the applicant. All attempts must be made to retain healthy suitable trees in the first instance.
- b) Where the relocation of a crossover or a request for vehicular access requires tree removal the applicant must meet the cost of the tree removal as in 5 a. All attempts must be made to retain healthy suitable trees including finding an alternative location for a crossover so as to retain a tree.
- c) Where trees are indicated for removal on a streetscape plan, landscape plan or works program approved by the Shire, an equal number of trees may be planted in other suitable sites at the discretion of the EMTRS.

d) All trees to be provided as a result of development requests will be chosen with reference to the *Street Tree Planning: Selections and Recommendations* and authorised by the EMTRS.

#### 6. Public Awareness & Community Responsibility

a) The Shire of Narrogin will encourage property owners to retain trees on private property, particularly where they contribute to the skyline or streetscape.

Residents wishing to extend garden planting onto their verge must seek permission from the Shire, ensuring thoroughfare is retained, and site lines are not hindered. The applicant will supply plan/design to the EMTRS for approval. The maintenance of verge plantings will be by the private land owner. The Shire reserves the right to remove the verge planting at any time due to disputes, the planting representing a hazard or at the discretion of the EMTRS.

- b) Businesses, schools and government organisations will be encouraged to develop and maintain appropriate plantings particularly on the street front verge. The maintenance of verge plantings will be by the private land owner. The Shire reserves the right to remove the verge planting at any time due to disputes, the planting representing a hazard or at the discretion of the EMTRS.
- c) Residents will be encouraged to monitor the needs of newly planted trees adjacent to their property and provide additional watering when required.
- d) Disputes between neighbours over trees that are not under the jurisdiction of the Shire will not be entered into, unless the tree presents a hazard, whereby the Local Government Act 1995 will be referred to.
- e) Annual street tree planting will be undertaken by the Shire. Residents will be able to request street trees to be planted on their verge by contacting the Shire. The tree species will be determined by the Shire of Narrogin with reference to the *Street Tree Planning: Selections and Recommendations*.



#### Background

This item is re-presented from the Narrogin District Townscape Committee meeting held on 29 March 2018.

At the Narrogin District Townscape Committee meeting held on Thursday 29 March 2018, there was in attendance, two delegated Elected Members and two Deputy's; Cr Seale and Cr Fisher who were present as observers. Although ineligible to vote, Cr Seale moved Item 4.5 Bin Surrounds.

This vote was in breach of the Local Government Act 5.11A.

Therefore Item 4.5 Bin Surrounds is brought forward from the meeting 29 March 2018 and is re-presented to the Committee for endorsement.

#### Summary

At the meeting held on 14 December 2017, the Committee discussed the merits of installing 120ltr bins throughout the CBD instead of 240ltr bins with regards the volumes of waste collected in the existing 60ltr bins and noted that some bins fill up, some overflow and some collect very little waste.

The Committee supported a proposal by Townscape committee member Mr Crossley to undertake a waste audit to gain an insight into the volumes of waste being collected in each bin and to help determine the areas or streets where the most waste is collected.

#### Comment

On Wednesday 6 December 2017 a waste audit was carried out within the Narrogin CBD by Mr Crossley and an employee of the Shire's waste contractor.

The attached Bin Locations Map indicates the location of the existing 60ltr bins in the CBD area and the results of the waste audit. The waste audit results represent one day of collected waste.

The Shire's waste contractor has advised that the 60ltr bins located on Federal, Egerton and Earl Streets are emptied daily, and that the 240ltr bins located on Fortune Street are emptied three times per week and added that following the proposed replacement of 60ltr bins on Federal Street and the eastern end of Fortune Street with 240ltr bins, the bins will be emptied twice, possibly three times per week. The Shire's waste contractor has recommended the use of bin liner bags to reduce the occurrence of waste sticking in the bottom and odours.

Currently all the bins within the CBD are emptied manually. Following the installation of the remaining 240ltr bins, all 240ltr bins except those located on Fortune Street will be emptied mechanically.

#### OFFICERS' RECOMMENDATION

That the Committee:

- 1. Endorse the installation of fourteen x 240ltr bins and Walter Allure bin surrounds along Federal Street and the eastern end of Fortune at suitable spaced intervals to replace the existing 60ltr bins as pictured on the Bin Locations Map; and
- 2 Endorse the recommended locations for the installation of the remaining fourteen x 240ltr bins on Federal Street and the eastern end of Fortune Street based on the information provided in the CBD Federal Street Locations Map.




#### **Discussion and Findings**

Shane commented that on Wednesdays he collecte more rubbish than other days. He also commented that the amount we collected on 6 December (~1.9 bins full) was about 3/4 of that collected on most Wednesdays (up to 2.5 bins full).

From the data collected;


- only two bins contained 60 l of refuse or more (Bin 28 at Mackie Park and Bin 38 at Australia Post both of which contained about 151 & 251 office waste in garbage bags, respectively)
- 33 of the 43 bins in the survey contained and generally contain (according to Shane Paul) less than 60 l of refuse. In other words, at most ten of the 43 bins in the survey need to be larger than 60 litres
- no bin contained more than 100l of waste
- liquid waste (eg unempty drink containers) was an issue in some bins (near chicken treat and 240 l bins) causing waste to stick to bottom
- all 240I bins had odorous, putrid waste stuck in the bottom, which due to their depth could not be removed by hand
- some 60l bins also had waste sticking to the bottom but this was easily removed
- it normally takes 1 man about 1 hour to complete the bin round and is undertaken 3 -4 times per week
- Bin 38 at Australia Post contained significant amounts of recyclable waste suggesting that this could be a useful site for a recycle bin.


